Garbage Collection
Beach maintenance crews removed 1,500 tons of garbage from approximately 736 garbage collection stations on the beach and bay in 2023. That's the equivalent of 102,420 individual bags of trash! An additional 21,886 Leave No Trace items were also removed from South Walton beaches. These items often include beach chairs, umbrellas, towels and other beach gear.

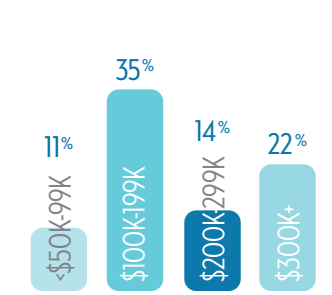
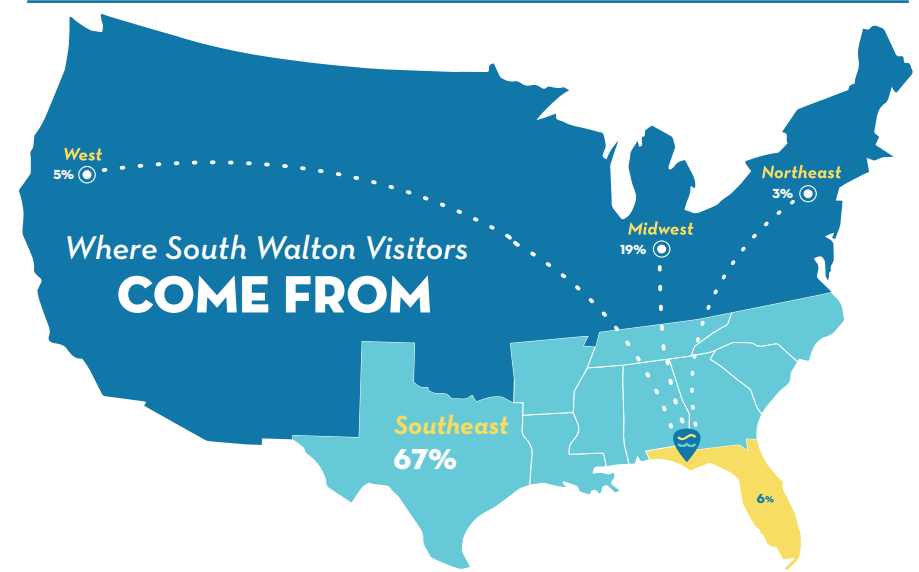

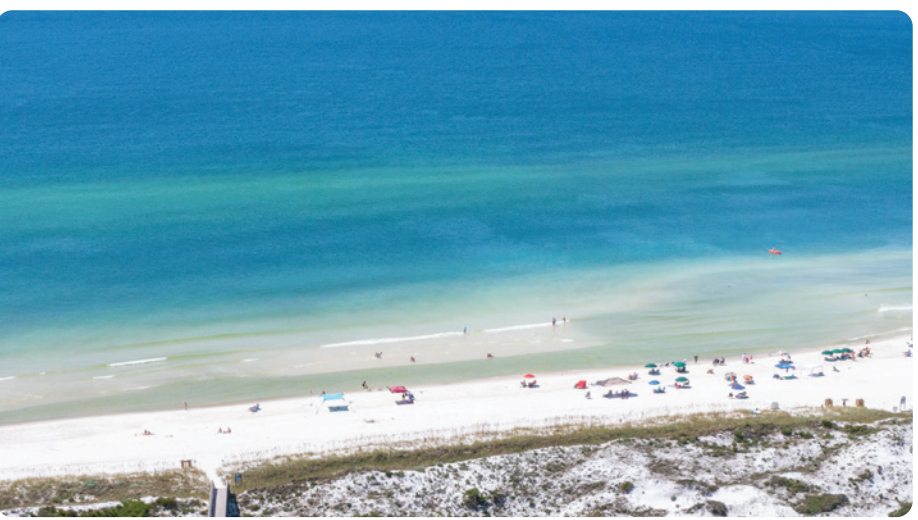
South Walton 2023 VISITOR DEMOGRAPHICS

— 2023 — TOURISM UPDATE



Wow. How is 2024 winding down already? It feels as though the new year has just begun.

Yet, as I take time to reflect on what we've experienced in our destination and what we accomplished, I'm excited – from capital improvement projects to fresh new campaigns, there is an energy inside Walton County Tourism we can all feel.

Our community continues to grow and new businesses open their doors – entrepreneurship is alive and well, from the Gulf-side beaches northward to the state line. Should anyone be surprised that Walton is one of the fastest growing counties in the country?

Based on our performance in 2023, tourism is holding strong in Walton County. The destination continues to see steady growth and remain a key player in the tourism marketplace. While some of our metrics declined from the prior year, it's not reflective of the sustainability in visitation we enjoy. In fact, from what our research team is seeing across the state and throughout the tourism economy, we are merely experiencing a "normalization" in visitation.

With travel restrictions being a thing of the past, many destinations are experiencing dips in visitation as travelers are exploring Europe and other countries that had been off limits in years past.

What did we see in 2023? Here's an overview of some key metrics. Walton County hosted more than 5.1 million visitors. Their direct spending, which totaled more than \$4.7 billion, contributed to an economic impact of \$6.8 billion for Walton County. All told, more than \$60 million in Tourist Development Tax was collected in 2023.

These are incredibly strong numbers and while this injection of spending from our visitors helps lower our residents' taxes – on average \$2,082 per household – it also supported more than 41,000 jobs (direct and indirect), generating \$1.2 billion in wages and salaries.

Tourism continues to work for Walton County.

Looking to the future, we understand every destination goes through changes and challenges and our team is up to the task. We will continue to explore opportunities to secure beachfront for new accesses, expand parking opportunities in strategic locations, and enhance our amenities throughout the county – all while balancing the needs of our community and protecting our fragile ecosystems.

On behalf of the Walton County Tourism Department, our team looks forward to working with the community and county leadership to keep our destination strong, all while supporting our community through a thriving visitor economy.

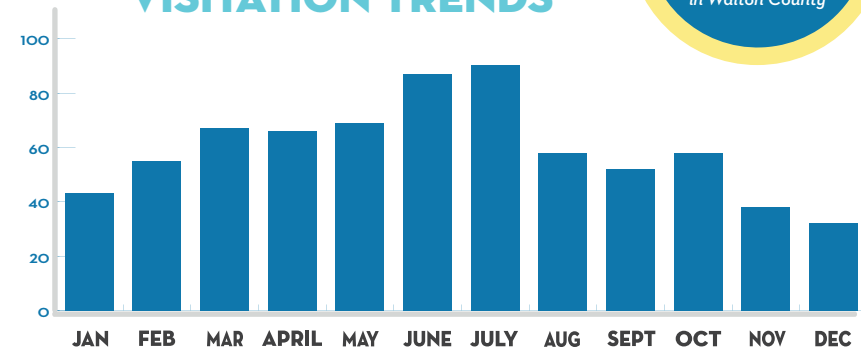

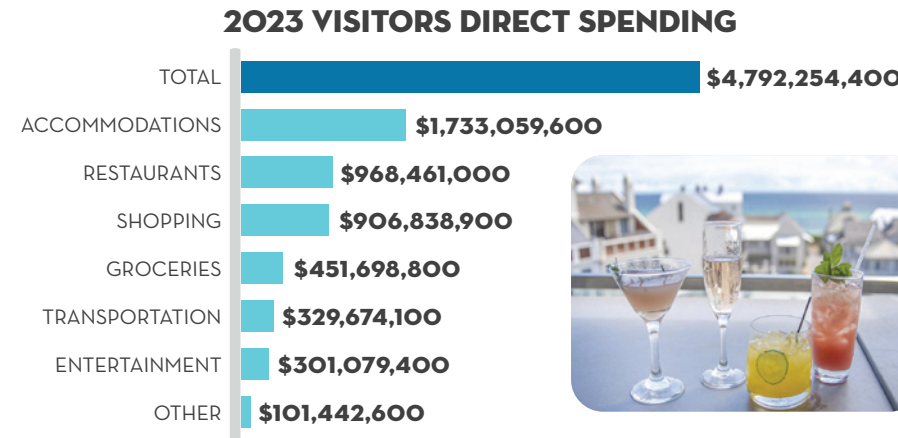

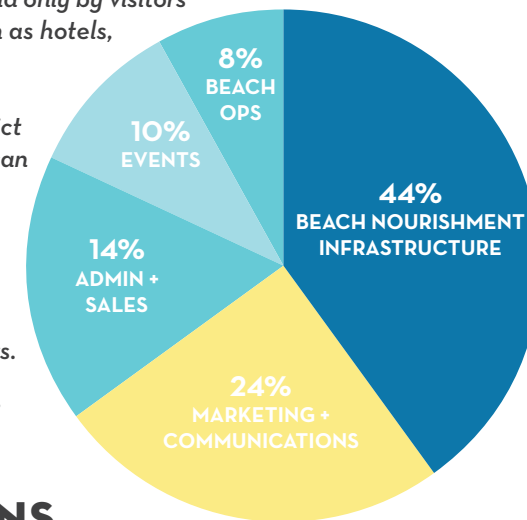

BEACH OPERATIONS

Regional Beach Access Updates

- Seagrove Regional Beach Access:** Located in the heart of Seagrove. This project includes parking with dedicated spaces for standard vehicles, ADA and bicycles, a 1,011 square foot restroom facility, handicap-accessible dune walkover and connectivity to the multi-use path.
- Walton Dunes Regional Beach Access:** Located at 258 Beachfront Trail. Improvements are expected to include 14 parallel ROW parking spaces with dedicated ADA, LSV and bicycle parking, restrooms and an ADA-accessible boardwalk.

Neighborhood Beach Access Renovations

The Walton County Tourism Department has been hard at work renovating and sometimes replacing entire neighborhood beach accesses, with the goal of keeping them in good condition and making upgrades before the integrity or appearance degrades from wear and tear.

South Walton Fire District

The Beach Safety Division, which is funded by the Walton County Tourism Department, had a budget of about \$2.5 million in 2023. In total, 55 beach safety staff were employed during 2023, the majority of whom worked to keep beaches safe during the busy spring and summer months. SWFD lifeguards performed 147 water rescues and responded to more than 400 medical calls in 2023, despite relatively calm surf conditions compared to years past. This demand for emergency services means beach safety is growing even more important in our coastal community. The SWFD Beach Safety program also enjoyed tremendous success in its 2023 Junior Lifeguard Program, enrolling a record number of participants for a summer of fun, education, and lifeguarding experience.



Grayton Beach Shuttle

Operated shuttle vehicles 7 days a week from 6 am to 10 pm. 182,801 guests were transported between Grayton Central Parking and Grayton Beach Public Beach Access in 2023.

Parking Projects

Grayton Beach Municipal Parking Facility: Located at 1505 S. Co. Hwy. 283. This 1,700 square foot multi-level transit facility will have 204 parking spaces with dedicated ADA, electric car, LSV and bicycle parking areas, as well as restrooms, public transportation facilities and connectivity to the multi-use path.

393 Municipal Parking Facility: Located at 1668 S. Co. Hwy. 393, approximately three quarters of a mile from Ed Walline Regional Beach Access. It will contain 83 parking spaces with dedicated parking for ADA, LSV, bicycles and a 1,300 square foot transit building with a restroom facility.

Other Projects

Camp Creek Lake Canoe & Kayak Launch: Located at 121 S. Camp Creek Road South just north of 30A. This coastal dune lake access park will include ADA and bicycle parking, landscape, an ADA-accessible pier with canoe/kayak launch, and stormwater systems.

Cessna Landing Park Improvements: Located at 1689 Co. Hwy. 393 N. in Santa Rosa Beach. Plans are to add two additional docks, replace the existing pavilions and reconfigure/repave existing driveways and parking areas. Additional work will include hardscape, landscape, site utilities, site grading/drainage and stormwater.

Grayton Beach Community Center: Located at 44 Hotz Avenue in Grayton Beach. Once completed, the 1,600 square foot building will house a local information station, restrooms, an observation deck, a boardwalk to the beach and access to the Beach Tram.

Kellogg Park Nature Center: Located at 855 Nursery Rd. in Santa Rosa Beach. This Nature Center will be an 1,800 square foot assembly-style building for nature watching and community gatherings, with access to the kayak launch.

Legion Park Improvement: Located at 119 Crest Drive. Proposed improvements include a splash pad, new playground equipment, two launch piers, additional pickleball courts, resurfacing of the basketball court, construction of shade pavilions and additional parking for cars, trucks and trailers.
